Historical Enquiry using Evidence













- I know that the Shang Dynasty ruled in China from 1600-1046BC. I understand the terms 'dynasty' and 'empire' and can discuss the similarities and differences. I know that the Bronze Age was happening in Britain at the same time as the rule of the Shang Dynasty.
- I know that historians do not have many sources to rely on for information about the Shang Dynasty and can discuss possible reasons for this. When looking at photographs of artefacts, I can formulate opinions on the items and think about what they may tell us.
- I know that the Shang Dynasty is the earliest part of Chinese history that historians have found evidence (artefacts) from.
- I know that the first Shang king was Cheng Tang who
 defeated the Xia dynasty in the Battle of Mingtiao, and the
 last Shang king was Di Xin, defeated in a great battle
 by Wu of Zhou. His people had started to become
 unhappy with the way he ruled and did not fight with him.
- I know that during this period, there was lots of progress made in society and many achievements. I can name and discuss these e.g., in writing, housing, and farming.
- I can make comparisons and links between previous knowledge and my new knowledge about the Shang Dynasty.

Our Key Vocabulary:

Word	Meaning
Dynasty	A society that is ruled by one family throughout the ages. Power is transferred from the ruler to the successor when they die. It is a family line of rulers.
Empire	A group of countries ruled over by one country and its monarch or system of government. There is central rule in place.
Source	Sources help us understand the past. Primary sources come from that time period and secondary sources are written after the period.
Artefact	An object from the time period that can help historians understand what life was like.
Descendants	The children (usually the son) of the ruler.
King	A male monarch of the Dynasty with ruling power.
Emperor	A ruler of an empire.
Bronze Age	The age which followed the Stone Age and preceded the Iron Age.
Agriculture	The practice of farming.
Yellow River	The second longest river in China.
Chronology	The arrangements of dates in time order.

Steps in learning	
○	I can recall prior knowledge about the concept of Empire, considering knowledge learnt about the British Empire, the Roman Empire, and the Viking invasion of Britain. I can place these on a timeline in chronological order. I can identify China on a modern world map. How did the Shang Dynasty form? A study on how the Shang Dynasty formed, using available evidence. I can make comparisons and find differences between the formation of the Shang Dynasty and the Roman Empire. I understand the difference between a dynasty
?*********************************	what was life like in the Shang Dynasty? An enquiry into the achievements, religion, and society of the Shang Dynasty. How does this compare with life in the Roman Empire? I can find comparisons and identify differences between these aspects of the Shang Dynasty and the Roman Empire.
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	Children will formulate and write a response to the enquiry question, 'How does the Shang Dynasty differ to other Empires?'.

What I already know:

In Key Stage One, children learnt about Mary Seacole and her efforts in Crimea to help soldiers. They learned that she came from Britain, the leader of the British Empire at the time. Children explored why Mary Seacole worked for the British Empire.

In Unit 4, children will learn about the achievements of the Ancient Greek and Egyptian Empires and will be able to compare these to the knowledge learnt about the Shang Dynasty. They will also explore the British Empire in more depth and its impact on nations within the Empire.

Across the school, there is an emphasis on chronology and children will be able to place events and periods learnt about on a timeline.
