RE- What is the Trinity and why is it important to Christians?

The Powerful Knowledge we will take away from this Learning Enquiry (what children will be learning):

Making sense of beliefs



Understanding the impact



Children will learn about and recognise what a 'Gospel' is and give an example of the kinds of stories it contains. They will offer suggestions about what texts about baptism and Trinity mean. Children will be able to give examples of what these texts mean to some Christians today.

Children will describe how Christians show their beliefs about God the Trinity in worship in different ways (in baptism and prayer, for example) and in the way they live.

Making connections



Connecting

Children will begin to make links between some Bible texts studied and the idea of God in Christianity, expressing clearly, some ideas of their own about what Christians believe God is like.


What I already know:

In Unit 2, the children will have learnt about what God is like for Christians. This is built upon in this unit of work as the children explore what it is like to follow God. This unit develops the concept of the three components of The Trinity. Year 4 children will think back to previous learning in Year 3, on Hinduism and the way in which the Hindu God Brahman, has different facets.

Baptism is a ceremony that symbolises a commitment to living a life as a Christian. Jesus was baptised in the New Testament by John the Baptist. Holy water is put on baptised people by a church leader as a symbol of being cleansed and made ready for a new life for God.



The Trinity is the concept that God is ONE God in THREE persons, The Father, The Son, and the Holy Spirit.



The word gospel means "good news", since it narrates Jesus Christ's life and teaches Christians to believe that He was born to save the world from sin and make humans truly know God as a Father.
