What I already know:

In year 3/4 I learned about 'What it is like to follow God' and 'What kind of world Jesus wanted' and the impact of Pentecost. In year 3/4, I also focused on The Trinity: how Christian's view God as the father, son, and holy spirit. In this unit of work, I will be exploring different meanings of biblical texts, how Christian's put their beliefs into practice and articulating my own responses to the idea of the importance of love and service in the world today. This will then lead on to when I'm in KS3, where I will explore these different views and how they impact on wider current affairs.

The Kingdom of God key learning points:

- The Kingdom of God is where God rules in human hearts and minds, lives, and communities.
- Jesus compares God's Kingdom to a festival, a party, a treasure, a secret, a seed that grows, a harvest, and a wedding.
- For Christians today, across the world, being a member of the community of the Kingdom of God is a precious gift, and a challenge: living out the values of the Kingdom of God is the key challenge of being a disciple of Jesus, loving God and loving our neighbour.
- Christians use these texts to remind themselves of the way the world is supposed to be, and to reflect on how careful they must be not to forget that they are living in God's Kingdom. Many might say they find it easier not to let God rule in their lives, as Jesus' example shows that they may well end up in conflict with others.
- Christians might study the parables in private Bible reading and prayer, or in prayer groups, or listen to a sermon in church.

- Heaven is a beautiful, loving, caring and perfect place, and that life on earth would be wonderful if it could be more like that in daily life.
