

One way that Muslims show their beliefs and faiths today is through **Sadaqa**. **Sadaqa** is a voluntary charitable act towards others, whether through generosity, love, compassion, or faith. These acts are not necessarily physical. Simple good deeds such as a smile, or a helping hand, are seen as acts of sadaqa.

The Five Pillars of Islam

The Five Pillars of Islam are essential to the daily lives of Muslims. The Five Pillars of Islam are five duties that Muslims try to carry out. It helps them to live a good and responsible life and bring them closer to God (Allah) and their community.

Each pillar has a different name; Shahada, Salah, Zakat, Sawm, and Hajj.
