

The Little Red Hen and Phonics



The children have enjoyed activities linked to The Little Red Hen book. We have been retelling the story and using drama to act out different scenes. Through repitition, the children can now confidently join in with and recite key phrases from the story. They are very excited to bake bread next week. Their reaction was 'What? Real bread that we can eat?'


As part of their learning some children have started wrting simple words from the story. We are focusing on the words cat, dog, hen, duck, mill, red. We are supporting the childen to identify the sounds in these words and use the correct letter formation when writing them.

As discussed in the phonic meeting it is essential that children learn to form their letters correctly. We have assigned an activity on Seesaw for your child to practise writing the word cat. There are videos to help your child use the correct letter formation. We always remind the children that learning new skills is tricky and we always praise their efforts and hard work.

In Read Write Inc this week the children have been learning new sounds f, l, k, r. We have assigned a speed sound video on Seesaw for your child to watch and practise. We recommend your child watches this daily to help them learn the sounds. If you have any questions please come and ask us.







Mathematics

In maths lessons this week we have continued learning about pairs. We know that a pair means two of something and a matching pair means two of the same. We have been playing lots of matching pairs games this week. Although this is a maths activity the children were learning lots of other skills. They worked in small groups to find the matching pairs. They demonstrated respect by taking turns and they were developing a range of thinking skills.

Memory games benefit children in many ways. They help improve concentration, creativity and problem-solving skills. Memory games can help to promote cognitive development by improving a child's short-term and long-term memory. Short-term memory is the ability to hold information in the mind for a brief period of time and long-term memory is the ability to retain information over a long period of time. While playing memory games, children will likely have to remember a series of items or numbers, as well as where they belong. As they progress, they will be required to recall these items, which will help to develop their memory skills.

We encourage you to play matching pairs games at home. We read the book 'Simon Sock' by Nick East. You can enjoy this story on Seesaw.










Reading for Pleasure – Mystery Reader
