Teamwork



Our school value for this half term is 'Teamwork'. We learn our school values through dinosaurs, and we would like to introduce you to 'Teamatops'.



I am Teamatops. I am very good at working with other people. I always listen to my friend's ideas and enjoy working out how to solve problems together. I am great at sharing my ideas and know that we can achieve more by working as a team.

Teamwork is about working with other people and listening to the ideas of others. We will teach the children to:

- Work well with others.
- Take on a role in a group such as a scribe or reporter.
- Contribute to a group's decisions.
- Support and resolve fall outs in a group.

We will also talk to the children about how teamwork is an essential skill for the future and how it relates very much to our school aim of 'Ready for Work.'

On Monday, we spent an afternoon engaged in a rotation of activities to explore the skills of teamwork:

- Activity 1 We read the story of 'The Enormous Turnip'. Then we used drama to act out the play. We discussed how sometimes it is much easier to work as a team to get things done.
- Activity 2 We talked about the different jobs in the future that will require teamwork skills. The children pretended to be builders and built a wall together using large bricks. We talked about how it is easier to work as a team and help each other imagine how tiring and how long it would take to do it on your own!
- Activity 3 We read the story 'That Fruit is mine!' by Anuska Allepuz. We had to hold hands in a circle
 and try to get a hula hoop around the circle without letting go of hands or breaking the circle. We had to
 work as a team and support each other to help the hoop move around the entire circle. We talked about
 the importance of communication in a team what happens if not everyone follows the rules in a team
 game.

Teamwork continued

Activity 4 - We had to work in teams to get everyone from one side to the other by only standing on the
yellow dots. We were not allowed to stand on the floor so we had to collaborate and pass the spare yellow
dot to the other team members so that our group could move forward. We talked about how everyone
has a role when working as a team. You need to communicate effectively to share ideas and take turns.
There was then an extra challenge as the teams had to collect bean bags as they travelled.

The children enjoyed working together and we are very proud of them. We will continue to provide opportunities for the children to demonstrate teamwork. We always talk to the children about how they can use their school values in school and at home.

Lunar New Year

This week we have been finding out about Lunar New Year. People in Hong Kong and other Chinese communities around the world celebrate Chinese New Year according to the lunar calendar. The New Lunar Year was celebrated on the 10th February and this is the Year of the Dragon.

We talked about the special traditions that take place at this time, such as gathering with family, decorating homes with lanterns, and the giving of red envelopes with money inside. The dragon dance is often performed during Chinese New Year as dragons are a symbol of China's culture, and they are believed to bring good luck to people. We also shared the Chinese zodiac story – here is a link if you would like to watch it with your child. We recapped our learning from Autumn term when we talked about celebrations. We compared the Lunar New Year to the other celebrations we had explored in the past (Bonfire Night, Diwali, Christmas) and talked about the similarities and differences. The children recognised that many celebrations are enjoyed with family and friends. Homes are decorated, special food is shared, and sometimes people enjoy fireworks. We will continue our learning on Lunar New Year next week. We hope to make and taste our own simple Chinese noodles. The ingredients will be fresh egg noodles, onions, and soy sauce. We will also be tasting prawn crackers and vegetable spring rolls. Please make sure your child's medical information is up to date on Arbor. If you have any queries, please let us know. We will also be performing our own dragon dance.



Shrove Tuesday

As part of our Religious Education curriculum, on Tuesday we celebrated Shrove Tuesday. We talked about the meaning of Shrove Tuesday to Christians and how Shrove Tuesday is the start of Lent. We talked about how some people give up things, e.g. chocolate, during this time.

The children whisked the ingredients to make the batter and then watched while Mrs Bastin cooked the pancakes. The children used the language crack, mix, whisk, batter, liquid, flip, measuring jug, half, quarter, grams, and millilitres. We talked about how the batter is a liquid and then it turns to a solid when it is cooked. Their favourite part was eating the pancakes. They were very yummy!







Maths - 3D Shapes

Last week the children explored 2D shapes and this week they extended their learning to 3D shapes. We explored cubes, cuboids, cylinders, spheres, pyramids, and cones. We talked about the similarities and differences, and if they had curved or flat surfaces. The children experimented with the 3D shapes by trying to make towers with the 3D shapes and seeing which ones would roll down a slope. They worked in teams and had to explain why some shapes did not stack to make a tower, i.e. spheres and pyramids, and why other shapes did not roll down a ramp, i.e. cubes and cuboids. The children found it tricky to remember the names of the 3D shapes but had lots of fun experimenting. We will continue looking in our learning environment to find and name the 3D shapes to help us.

Home learning – please could you help your children search around the home to name some 3D shapes. Please take some pictures and send them to us on Seesaw. They could also bring an example to school to show their friends (i.e. a cuboid cereal box). Thank you for your continued support.








Lego Discovery
