

Our Key Vocabulary:

Theist	Believes in God.
Agnostic	Cannot say if God exists or not.

What I already know:

I have learned about the Christian faith across Units 1-4, and now will begin to articulate and investigate why some people choose not to follow these teachings and have different opinions. This will then lead on to when I'm in KS3, where I will explore these different views and how they impact on wider current affairs.

Examples of why some people believe in God:

- Family upbringing/ home background.
- Religious experience- some people may have 'experienced the presence' of God.
- They may feel unsure of what to do with their life and want a structure/ clear path to follow through religion.
- They might believe that the universe/ Earth was made by an 'almighty creator'.



Some viewpoints can see benefits and challenges of believing in God. Here are some:

Benefits:

- These people feel they have a 'path' they can follow- for example Jewish people believe the Torah gives them a 'map of life' with guidance to follow. Muslims follow the Qu 'ran and Christians follow the Bible.
- These people feel they have a connection to God who they can communicate with through religious practices such as prayer.

Challenges:

- There can be different views across different religions. So people may have different beliefs about God.
- There can be different views in the same religion. For example: in Christianity, Genesis can be interpreted differently by Christians. Some believe that God was the creator of the Earth and take Genesis as a 'literal' reading. However, others rely on evolutionary theory to explain our origins.
- People will not always agree with their views.

Examples of why some people do NOT believe in God:

- Family upbringing/ home background.
- They may think that there can't be a God with such terrible suffering in the world.
- Unanswered prayers.
- They may think that religions are just created by people.
- Some people may think a creator does not explain the existence of the earth, but instead, science does.
