Topic: Geography Term: Autumn 1 Year: Unit 3 Duration: 5 weeks

The Powerful Knowledge we will take away from this Learning Enquiry (what children will be learning):











- There are three countries in Scandinavia Norway, Denmark, and Sweden. Their capital cities are Oslo, Copenhagen, and Stockholm. They are located in the Northern Hemisphere in a continent called Europe. Sweden and Denmark are part of the European Union, but Norway is not.
- There are geographic similarities and differences between Scandinavian countries and the UK including in climate, tourism, and physical features and why people choose to live in different areas. Including a contrast between cities, towns and villages and offering explanations about the location of some geographical features.
- The effects that the climate has on resource distribution, tourism and the people living there.
- The lives of people living in Scandinavia are affected by the landscape and other physical features including daylight hours.
- Identify the key markers on a globe, an atlas and on a map, e.g. the tropic of Cancer, the equator and Ordnance Survey map symbols.
- Research and debate the physical and human features of locations in Scandinavia, drawing conclusions from different sources.
