We will continually develop the newsletter to include competitions, games, and book reviews, so watch this space! As another term draws to a close, we are proud to share with you the rich opportunities our children have had to expand their love of reading this term.

Reading for Pleasure – What is it?

The term 'Reading for Pleasure' means reading for fun and enjoyment. Children can independently choose their reading material, where they would like to read and who they would like to read with. It is a relaxed, informal, and social time when children can share books (fiction, non-fiction, poetry, magazines). The children have ownership of this time, and they can share their interests and talk about books with their friends.

Every child is on a reading journey and although some children may not yet be able to read fluently, they are still able to enjoy books through illustrations and book talk. We have a passion across the school to inspire all children to find pleasure in reading. We have implemented a whole school strategy to promote the love of reading and we are delighted to extend this passion to you through our reading newsletter, 'Reading Matters'.

Unit 1 (Foundation)

In Foundation the children have embraced their 'Reading for Pleasure' time. They demonstrate such passion and enthusiasm for reading. The wonderful weather has enabled them to take their enjoyment outside to explore different areas of the school to enjoy a book.










To inspire children to explore different books and to teach them new vocabulary, we introduce a variety of rich texts around our learning. The book 'Bonkers about Beetroot' has been very popular and Puffins and Penguins enjoyed a variety of activities to help immerse them in the story. They used drama to retell the narrative, made story maps, they innovated the story to create their own twist on the ending and they tasted beetroot brownines and made beetroot smoothies. All of these activities help children to have fun with books and help inspire a love of reading.









Unit 2 (Years 1 & 2)

The children in Unit 2 have thoroughly enjoyed visiting other classes throughout the school to share a book with a book buddy. It has been lovely to see the older children in Key Stage 2 taking a lead in reading to their younger school friends. New friendships were forged, and old friends enjoyed catching up and looking at a story together. Sharing books across the school has promoted a sense of school community and a shared love of reading.









We have continued to visit the school library once a week, where the children can pick a library book to bring home to share with a grown up. Using the library regularly helps the children to value and appreciate books and reading.

They relish the opportunity to take responsibility for choosing their own book and remembering to return it safely each week.

We take time to learn those skills involved in selecting a book to enjoy. Looking at the front cover, reading the title, recognizing a familiar author, flicking through a few pages, looking at the illustrations, chatting to a friend who recommends it, reading the blurb...

<u>Unit 3 (Years 3 & 4)</u>

The children in Unit 3 have enjoyed reading for pleasure throughout the year. With great enthusiasm, Unit 3 children have seized every available opportunity to demonstrate their love of reading by regularly (and often passionately) discussing their favourite books in class. Their recommendations have inspired others to read new and unfamiliar authors and widen their reading territory. They relish the opportunity to for time to use the outside spaces, such as the balcony or woodland camp, to immerse themselves in their chosen books.

Children in Unit 3 have spoken about the joy that 'escaping into a novel' can bring. Their use of vocabulary has flourished because of these experiences. Additionally, the children have raced to grow their sunflowers on Accelerated Reader to show their understanding of the books they have read. The children have looked forward to sharing books with children from other Units and have enjoyed planning reading and choosing books that they felt others would also enjoy. Use of the school and public libraries has enabled many of children to expand their reading choices and has created an excitement and 'buzz' around book selection. It has been a delight to watch children waiting and looking forwards to another child finishing a book so they can read it too. Books have inspired children to become aspirant adventurers, scientists and activists and have encouraged them to see the real world, and imaginary worlds, in whole new ways.











Unit 4 (Years 5 & 6)

In Unit 4 the children have enjoyed their 'Reading for Pleasure' time where they have had the opportunity to choose from a rich variety of texts and explore these independently or with their peers. It has been wonderful to see the children so immersed in book talk and developing their love of reading. Unit 4 have taken great pleasure in our 'Book Buddies' time where they have explored books with children all across the school - all the way down to Foundation Stage! A selection of children have also helped to develop reading for pleasure across the school and have continued to read to children on the KS1 playground during lunchtimes; they are fantastic role models who have encouraged the younger children to pick up a book and read. At the end of the day, Unit 4 have enjoyed their 'Read Aloud' time where their teacher reads a high-quality fiction, non-fiction, or poetry book with them, exposing the children to a variety of outstanding authors, and giving them a choice on what book they would like to read as a class – creating autonomous readers. We are very proud of the whole of Unit 4 and their continued determination with achieving their Accelerated Reader targets for the last two half-terms. It is clear that their love of reading and pleasure for reading has helped them to reach this significant achievement.










Poetry Performance


Aimed at age 4-11 years

Winnie in Space.





Counting on Katherine


